THE SCHOLARSHIP The Normandy High School Alumni Association's primary purpose is to provide scholarships for graduating seniors. Each year, scholarships are awarded in memory of Superintendent Morris Blitz (\$3000 for up to four years-endowed); teacher and basketball coach John Masterson (\$1000-endowed); teacher Esther Goff (\$3000 for up to four years); Superintendent James E. Westbury (\$1000). Graduating seniors are interviewed and selected through an application process by alumni board members and high school staff. Students must be ranked in the top 50% of the graduating class and have at least a 2.5 GPA; is seen as a person of high integrity and character; highly motivated to succeed at a college or vocational school level, and a desire to give back to the community and future graduates. Yearly donations are needed to continue to provide student scholarships and help support high school students' needs. We are proud of the students who have received scholarships through this organization and have attended universities and vocational schools worldwide. To become a member of the alumni



The Normandy Alumni Association is indebted to Wayne Brasler, NHS class of 1958. At least twice a year since 2001, he has dedicated himself to covering Normandy history and news of, as he likes to say, "the past, the present and the future" in the Alumni Courier.

Of course, the Courier was Normandy's student newspaper full of articles, photos of campus events, issues on campus and even around the world. letters to the editor, humor, sports, clubs, and so much more. So, he wanted to emulate the award-winning student publication for the alumni version, and he certainly accomplished that goal, even using the same font that had been used for many years.

Topics included in the many issues were: Historic photographs

from old Sagas, articles on many of NSD's elementary schools, Junior High (later the Middle School), the High School, the history of Camp Viking, features on alumni and senior scholars, letters to the editor (often praising the Alumni Courier), sharing memories of our neighborhoods, people and places that were an important part of our lives from one end of the district to another. He loved every tiny aspect of the district's history and the high school's history.

Most important to Wayne were the people that makeup Normandy. The people who worked to make the district and the high school a reality. Students who were scholars, whether in 1924 (the first graduating class) through the years until today, 2021.

The students' activities, clubs, Saga Kings and Queens, Snow Kings and Queens, Homecoming, fashions of the time, theater, campus changes, tearing down the Big Gym, the pool, building the spectacular Viking Hall, Industrial Arts, Culinary School, Honor Society, beloved teachers, sports activities, the renowned basketball Christmas Tournament, the outstanding music program including the award-winning band, symphony, and choral groups.

The people and their stories made the Alumni Courier so much fun to read. He's made great friends with



current faculty members, former alumni, and current graduates, to his delight. He is a great supporter of the annual Spring musicals and the Music Director, Duane Foster.

Why the long list? I haven't touched on everything good about Normandy High School and what Wayne is so devoted to.

Because there was and is Award-winning, of course. so much that is good and even outstanding about our Alma Mater and educators.

It was also crucial for Wayne to recognize and memorialize classmates that we have lost. He made sure to have the basic information that he had received and would research old Sagas and newspapers to find more details about the person's life, including their senior portrait.

Wayne was in on the very first alumni association planning meeting. He lives in Chicago, and any forum, Homecoming, alumni dinner, meeting senior scholars, attending Normandy plays, and more meant a drive or an airplane trip to St. Louis. He was most happy to be there and take photographs of the articles he wrote. Before he retired, he was the faculty leader of The University of Chicago High School newspaper.

The initial meetings led to Brasler offering to do the two issues of the Alumni Courier each year. It was decided that it would serve as an incentive to alumni who paid their \$10 annual membership dues to join the alumni association. And it was a home run! Alumni loved it from the first issue to the final points in 2019. Many alumni told us it was 'the' reason they joined. In addition, he made some special editions; one was the History of Normandy Alumni Courier issue.

The gift Wayne has given our incredible association really can't be explained. He spent all of those years giving his heart, blood, and soul, time, patience, research skills, and plain ol' stubbornness (getting it to the printer even though a whole issue had disappeared on him.) So finally, I asked, "What are you going to do now?" He replied, "What else? Start rewriting."

The point is we'll never know how fast or large we would have grown as an organization without Wayne Brasler's tremendous contribution to the Alumni Courier. But we do know that because of the former grads that the newspaper enticed to join our cause, the Board of Directors (all volunteers) have met some lovely, interesting, generous,

genuine alumni from the 1930s through 2021. In addition. we've been able to help many Normandy graduates since 2002 with scholarships that made a DIFFERENCE.

My thanks to all of the beautiful people who have served on the Board through the years. It was my honor to serve with each of vou. In addition, it was an honor to help plan and host significant alumni events -picnics, Homecoming lunches/football games. and dinner dances, and all that involves behind the scenes, and help provide scholarships to deserving students of NHS

Wayne Brasler's significant contribution helped bring this vital work to fruition for twenty years.

The Normandy High School Alumni Association Board of Directors and the Alumni thank you, Wayne Brasler, from the bottom of our hearts for your outstanding dedication and hard work. We realize it was indeed a labor of love.





